

# Putting the lamp under the lampstand



### Al Overview

"Putting the lamp under the lampstand" describes the act of placing a lit lamp in an inappropriate, concealing location, such as a bushel or bed, rather than on its proper stand where its light can be seen and illuminate a room. This imagery comes from a parable in the <u>Gospels of Matthew</u>, <u>Mark</u>, and <u>Luke</u>, where Jesus uses it to teach that his followers should not hide their faith or good deeds but should instead allow their "light" to shine openly, visible to others and glorifying God.

The Parable's Meaning

# The Lamp:

Represents the light of Christ, the truth of the Gospel, or the believer's faith.

# • The Lampstand:

Symbolizes the public, open place where the light should be, signifying a visible witness.

# Hiding the Lamp:

Represents obscuring the truth through fear, sin, neglect, or a reluctance to share one's faith and good works publicly.

## The Goal:

Jesus emphasizes that the purpose of light is to reveal and illuminate. Therefore, believers are called to live an authentic, transparent life, allowing others to see Christ through their actions and words.

Biblical References

The parable is found in several Gospels:

## Matthew 5:15:

"nor does anyone light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house".

### Mark 4:21:

"Does anyone bring a lamp to be put under a basket or under a bed, and not to be placed on a lampstand?".

## Luke 8:16:

"No one lights a lamp and then covers it with a vessel or puts it under a bed, but puts it on a stand, that those who enter may see the light".
