There is **no public-facing article on the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI) website** that echoes the independent, hardline demand for total legislative repeal of the DOE energy rule found in the July 2026 MHARR report. While MHI covers the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) energy rule, its public-facing material focuses on celebratory news regarding regulatory delays, legal pauses, and legislative updates—such as hailing the *21st Century ROAD to Housing Act* as a "major win", whereas MHARR criticized it for failing to eliminate the energy mandate.
